Election Results and Analysis

Mike Lorrey and others

A huge thank you to everyone who went out and helped our candidates. Whether it was putting up or holding signs, sending in money, putting a bumper sticker on your car, or telling friends and neighbors about the Libertarian choice.

Even though various factors came together to prevent us from having a full slate on the ballot, there is definitely a big silver lining behind the cloud some of us have been feeling.

Massive turnout

Turnout was just massive, proving that a Get-out-the-Vote effort does work. At some polls, by Noon, turnout had exceeded that of the last election. People were waiting in line at 5:45am to vote. Lots of new voters coming out.

Rich Tomasso reported from Nashua that while standing at the polls he was interviewed by two national talk radio networks that "wanted to talk me because I voted for Badnarik. So I got 5 minutes with each one explaining why I voted Libertarian and the role of third parties and some of the big issues."

We should be heartened by our showing in District 2. It's still the best in that congressional district so far, despite a neck and neck presidential race, with record total turnout, which is when we typically do our worst. Richard Kahn's 3.4% with 11,311 votes is significantly better than the 2002 elections where Rosalie Babiarczy got 2.3% with 5051 votes, and the 2000 election when Brian Christeson got 2.3% with 6188 votes. This is a 50% improvement percentage wise, and about a 100% improvement in raw numbers.

If we were to extrapolate that

the 50-60 FSP members who have already moved here, increased activism from members, public perception of legitimacy and influence, regular media coverage, etc. can be correlated to an increase in votes for Libertarians by 5000-6000 over a single election cycle, this means that as more Porcupines move here, as we gain more credibility, grow our own membership, elect Libertarians to local office, and improve our fundraising, we could get 200,000 votes in this one congressional district for libertarian candidates when the FSP migration is completed. Double that for state-wide races and we control the state.

Of course, this is a pretty bold extrapolation to make on only a few data points. A diminishing utility curve would likely temper that significantly. A truer curve will start to take shape over the next few years. If we could get even 100,000 state-wide votes for us in any given race we will be competing head to head with the GOP and Democrats on their own terms, and will command a significant portion of the legislature.

Once we penetrate the statutory thresholds required for major party status (4% of the vote in state wide elections) regularly, we will start to build a popular synergy of legitimacy

that won't level off until we reach at least 20% popularity. We might have done that this year if our Senate candidate had made it onto the ballot, since the 1st district is actually much more supportive of us.

Past performance in the 1st district has typically been 3.1 to 3.3%. If we had shown similar improvement of 50%, Dan Belforti would have gotten 4.6% to 4.9% this election, statewide we'd have averaged over 4%, and gotten major party status for the first time since 1996. This is rather bittersweet to contemplate, but it does show how far we've come in just a few years.

Need to get serious

It also shows that we need to get very serious about running for major office and building up campaign infrastructures like the Dems and GOP have (though more honest). No one else will do it for us. An effective staff can overcome time and other commitments on the part of a busy candidate. We need to recruit more people to get them in active positions to share the load. Organizing county affiliates state-wide will help this immeasurably, so I encourage everyone to beat the bushes in their areas to get

There is definitely a big silver lining behind the cloud some of us have been feeling.

Recap of the Badnarik Campaign

A rather extensive preliminary report on Michael Badnarik's presidential campaign has been written and is circulating on the net for several weeks. It's far too long to reproduce here. Most of the criticisms are preliminary and we all have our own opinions about the campaign. It's not our place to Monday-morning quarterback.

Michael traveled to nearly every state in the country, did hundreds of media interviews, talked with thousands of voters and raised over \$1,000,000 for the campaign.

The campaign ran local and national ads, mostly concentrating in key battleground states, did professional polling, opened up a headquarters and had local and regional coordinators across the country. He participated in several televised debates with other third party and independent candidates.

Michael did receive some great endorsements, including many

RKBA groups and former Congressman Bob Barr of Georgia.

In the end our ticket got over 400,000 votes, better than Harry Browne's effort and with less media coverage. There is already talk of having Michael run again in 2008, but immediate plans seem to be focused on him making a run for major office in Texas in 2006. For now, Michael is probably taking a well-deserved rest.

county committees together.

While many members have been burned out from the 2002 election plus the 2003 FSP vote back to back, I hope we can all start on the ground work now to make for an effective 2006 election. We need to go out to the membership and recruit people, appoint them to positions of responsibility in their area, and let them run with the ball.

I found out that Rich Kahn received 255 votes in Amherst, which was almost 4%, a high for the 2nd district. I stood outside the Amherst polling station from 6am to 1 pm that day, holding Rich's signs. If I'd stood outside until polls closed I think I could have pushed his numbers over 4%.

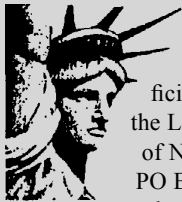
If we'd had members holding Rich's signs at every polling station across the district, we likely could have gotten him over 4%. I am convinced that poll signs are effective at grabbing undecided/uniformed voters at the last minute.

Local elections are next year, and it is time to start recruiting the candidates for those elections, training them, and promoting them to be effective in the upcoming elections. We can no longer afford to wait until the last minute and toss out sacrificial lambs.

By applying the lessons we have learned, organizing better and getting our base motivated behind our candidates, and in the meanwhile getting important ballot law reforms enacted, we can get ballot status in 2006 and so go into 2008 not having to petition, having a presidential primary and onward and upward to greater success.

In other political news, Rich Tomasso was appointed to the Nashua Conservation Commission. So far it has been an educational experience. Dan Belforti is now hosting a weekly political talk show, "Left, Right & Correct with Dan Belforti & Friends" each Friday morning from 11 to noon on Portsmouth Community Radio, WSCA 106.1 FM. It has the unique position of not having left or right bias in order to objectively evaluate alternate solutions to complex public policy problems.

They are ambitious yet achievable and cover such areas as candidate recruitment and elections, fundraising, outreach, legislation, membership and affiliate organizing.

One caveat. While the board has adopted the goals, they will only be achieved with your help. We are a volunteer organization and you, the members, are needed for everything we do. If everyone donated just one hour of time per week or became a monthly pledger, all our goals could be achieved. The six members of the board cannot do it alone. How will you help?

Increase membership

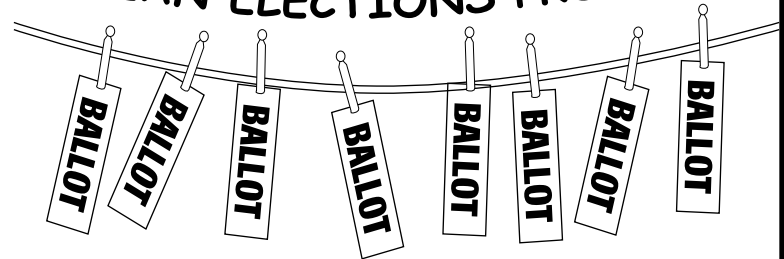

INTERVIEW

HARRY BROWNE TALKS ABOUT HIS NEW BOOK, LIBERTY A-Z

Harry Browne, the Libertarian Party's 1996 and 2000 presidential candidate, has published a new book, Liberty A-Z: 872 Libertarian Soundbites You Can Use Right Now.

As the title indicates, the book consists of soundbites -- ranging in length from one sentence to several paragraphs -- that address every major political issue from A (abortion) to Z (zero, flat tax rate of) from a Libertarian perspective.

The book is both timeless and timely: Browne created the soundbites over a 10-year span, starting shortly after he announced his first presidential campaign and continuing until early 2004. So, the book addresses perennial topics (taxes, gun control) and issues torn from today's headlines (the war in Iraq, George W. Bush).

Browne, an investment advisor and #1 best-selling author before turning to politics, used his renowned communication skills to craft the soundbites, using facts, humor, metaphors, and aphorisms. The book, he says, is his gift to libertarians, to help them better persuade Americans about the benefits of liberty.

In this interview, Browne discusses his favorite soundbite, the art of crafting pithy answers, and what to do if you don't like one of his soundbites.

Q: What's the secret to creating the perfect soundbite?

A: If there's a secret, I haven't discovered it. But I think the perfect soundbite should (a) be brief; (b) make a point in a self-evident way that the listener isn't likely to have heard before. If there's also humor, so much the better -- but a clear, persuasive point shouldn't be sacrificed just to make a soundbite funny.

Q: You were a political neophyte when you first ran for president. How difficult was it to give 15-second answers to very complicated questions?

A: I had never been involved in politics, but I had been selling my investment books on radio and TV for 25 years. I knew that I couldn't sell anything in a brief interview by giving a course in investing; everything had to get across in a very few words. I didn't have an organized repertoire of soundbites for selling investment books, but it quickly

became obvious that I needed them to "sell" political ideas.

Q: When did you decide to start collecting your soundbites?

A: If I'd had to rely on 3x5 cards, I never would have written them down; I would have relied on my imperfect memory, and I'd now have two or three soundbites. But the computer changes everything. With a computer file, you can categorize and sort easily.

I believe I started keeping track within two or three months of the beginning of my first campaign in August 1994. I strongly recommend that others do the same -- whether or not they are candidates for office.

Q: If you had to select one favorite soundbite from this book, which one would it be?

A: Perhaps the perfect soundbite is the one on abortion: "Given the government's record with the War on Poverty and the War on Drugs, we can assume that a War on Abortion would lead within five years to men having abortions." I have used it frequently and it has actually resulted in some instant conversions -- not to libertarianism, but at least to the idea that government is not the way to solve any problem. I've used it on Christian radio stations and been met with agreement.

Q: Is there one particular soundbite that never fails to get a laugh, or to get most people to express agreement?

A: Perhaps the abortion soundbite above. Notice, however, that you shouldn't expect a soundbite to convert someone immediately. The purpose is to change the terms of discussion. The soundbite calls attention to a facet of the subject that's been overlooked (such as that government never solves any problem, so why are we discussing having government solve this one?). If the soundbite is good, it will steer the discussion away from irrelevancies or statistics, and into the heart of the matter.

For example, suppose someone pushes for government to get further into health care or to solve a current scandal through regulation. Statistics will be offered to support the "need" for government to do something. But all this overlooks the point that government doesn't work. So rather than debate the statistics, use a soundbite to remind the person that his plan to cure the problem through government is bound to fail.

Here, for example, is a soundbite to make that point: "Whenever you turn anything over to the government, it is no longer a scientific, medical, commercial, or ethical matter; it is now a political issue -- to be decided by people like Bill Clinton, Teddy Kennedy, George Bush, and Trent Lott -- whoever has the most political influence. Is this what you want -- to transform a serious issue into a political boondoggle?"

Q: Which soundbite did you find most difficult to craft?

A: This calls attention to an important point. When you proselytize or campaign, you can't be expected to know everything about every issue -- let alone the best way to change people's minds in a few words. But if you keep discussing a subject with others, keep studying the subject, and write down every succinct idea that occurs to you, eventually you'll develop a good soundbite.

I have always been for open immigration. For years, I focused on the welfare state as the magnet that attracts undesirable immigrants. It was only a year or two ago that I realized that I could make the point much faster with the "government doesn't work" argument.

That inspired a much more effective soundbite: "Government doesn't work, and government immigration policy won't work any better. The government can't keep drugs out of America, and it won't keep out anyone who really wants to get in. The net result of tighter immigration laws will be higher costs to the taxpayer, more opportunities for corruption in law enforcement, less freedom for

Americans, and harassment of American businessmen -- while illegal immigration continues unabated."

Q: What do you say if a Libertarian tells you he doesn't agree with your language or argument in one particular soundbite?

A: Craft your own, using the soundbites in the book as starting points. Don't ever use a soundbite you're not comfortable with or not prepared to back up. Mark the ones in the book that work for you and ignore those that don't.

Q: For whom do you think this book will be most useful?

A: For libertarians first -- because it will save them a great deal of time. But the soundbites are educational as well as sales tools, and so the book as a whole also is a useful tool. Give it to a friend who's on the fence about freedom. It's easy to read, since there's no involved plot or complicated thesis. Let him realize that "closing the borders" won't solve anything, that the FDA kills more people than it saves, that government isn't the answer to anything -- and that the obvious cure for our ills is more liberty.
